Just log on to the website <http://hindehouse.thesharpsystem.com> to send an e-mail into school with any worry or concern at whatever time of day or night. These e-mails will be picked up each school morning and dealt with as quickly as we can in a confidential way.

We work hard to support each child during the school day and we want everyone to have adults in school that they can turn to if they have a problem. However, we know that both children and adults can have worries which can seem much worse at night or times when people are alone.

Attendance

Congratulations to all 460 students who attended 100% during the first half term (159 at Primary, 301 at Secondary Phase). Everyone in school is trying hard to ensure that each student understands the importance of good attendance. The Secondary Phase has increased their overall attendance during the last half term compared with the same time last year.

Last year, Secondary Phase attendance for September to October half term was 90.9%. This year September to October half term is 92.2%. We will work hard to maintain and improve on this. Thanks to all who continue to support our efforts.

Attendance at Primary Phase for the half term is 95.25%, which is well above the position last year. Again, thanks to all who continue to support our efforts.

101 – A new non-emergency number for South Yorkshire Police

On Friday 4 November, South Yorkshire Police's non-emergency number will change to 101, replacing the existing 0114 2202020 number which will be gradually phased out. All forces in England and Wales will be using 101 as their non-emergency number by early 2012, as mandated by the Home Office. Every call to 101 will be charged at a 15p flat rate.

The introduction of 101 nationally has been agreed to relieve pressure on the 999 service and will enable forces to better prioritise calls.

101 will be a familiar number to residents in Sheffield as a partnership service between South Yorkshire Police and Sheffield City Council has been running in the city since 2006 and currently takes over 5,000 calls per month.

Since 2006, Sheffield residents have been able to report police non-emergency incidents and council issues such as vandalism, nuisance noise, abandoned vehicles, fly-tipping and broken street lighting through the same number. From 4 November, everyone in South Yorkshire will be able to contact South Yorkshire Police for non-emergency matters by calling 101. However, currently only Sheffield residents will be able to report council related issues in their neighbourhood through the same number.

In an emergency – when a crime is in progress or life is at risk – always call 999.

When should you call 101?

When it is less urgent than 999; for general enquiries, to contact local police or to report a crime that has already happened the public should always call 101. Crimes such as the following should always be reported by calling 101:

- Stolen car
- Vandalised property or criminal damage
- Suspicion of someone selling stolen goods
- Suspicion of local drug dealing
- Theft such as stolen mobile phones
- Drunken or rowdy behaviour

Sheffield residents can also report council issues using 101, such as:

- vandalism and graffiti
- noise nuisance
- abandoned vehicles
- dumping and fly tipping
- broken street lighting

What are the benefits of 101?

- A single, easy to remember number wherever you are in the county
- Flat rate cost, regardless of the duration, provider or whether you are calling from a mobile
- Same 24-hour service as 0114 2202020
- Reduced burden on the 999 service
- Better prioritisation of calls, making the police service more efficient and effective

Charity & Fundraising News

- £1800, yes £1800 ! That is the money raised by Hinde House Students during Activity4Fun day in July. Once again Hinde House students showed their generosity and commitment to helping others by digging deeply into their pockets to support Bluebell Wood Children's Hospice.

This is the largest single sum ever raised for a charity event and we are proud to be able to donate to the hospice which is our adopted charity.

- Jabran Yousaf in Y11 has started a campaign to raise money for an electronic drum kit to be used by all students at Hinde House. Other students have come up with fantastic ideas to help him raise money including Rochell Watson in Y10 who is organising a Christmas Concert to be held in the Secondary Phase Hall on 14th December.

The Garden revamped and looking great!

During October half-term a group of 11 Volunteers from Veolia together with Debs Scholey from Groundworks Sheffield and Miss Iredale, worked all day on the garden to do a lot of the tasks, which needed great physical effort and the use of drills, saws and hammers.

During the day they created 6 raised beds, made 2 new compost bins, dug out paths, dug over the raised beds, laid weed-suppressant matting on the paths and made 2 planters which are now sited in the Memorial Garden. We also have a large turf stack which will rot down over the winter to give us some fresh soil to use later next year, and have filled 2 more

compost bins (which have been donated) with more turves.

At the end of the day we had a delivery of 40 bags of compost and 20 bags of bark chippings. Sadly the Volunteers had left by then, but with the help of the ICT team (Dave, Dan, Adam and Daz) we managed to get all the compost and bark bags emptied and the area tidied up.

The new planters have now been filled and planted by Miss Iredale's Y9 group and should have a good show of daffodils and crocuses in the Spring. We also planted some more daffodils around the trees in the garden.



Y3/4 Visit to Magna

On Monday 17th October, as part of our 'Inventions and Machines' topic, the children in Year 3 and 4 went on a visit to Magna Science and Adventure Centre. We were on the lookout for clever inventions and machines and we found lots at Magna. Both children and adults had a great time in the Earth, Fire, Air and Water Pavilions, although some of us did get quite wet in the last one!

In addition to enjoying all the things that everybody gets to see when they visit Magna, we also took part in a special workshop to help us learn more about electricity. We impressed the teacher at Magna (and our own teachers!) with our knowledge and when we were given a problem to solve we stepped up to the challenge. 'A girl called Bella had been invited to a ball but all of her dresses were wet so it was our job to get them dry as quickly as possible and make sure that Bella could go to the ball'. We used buzzers, propellers, light bulbs, batteries, wires, spoons, water and metal rods to make big circuits to get Bella's dress dry. It was hard work but we managed it in the end!

We all had a fantastic day at Magna and we even got a bit of time to play on the adventure playground before it was time to return to school. *(Miss Briscoe)*

Reidy Youth Foundation

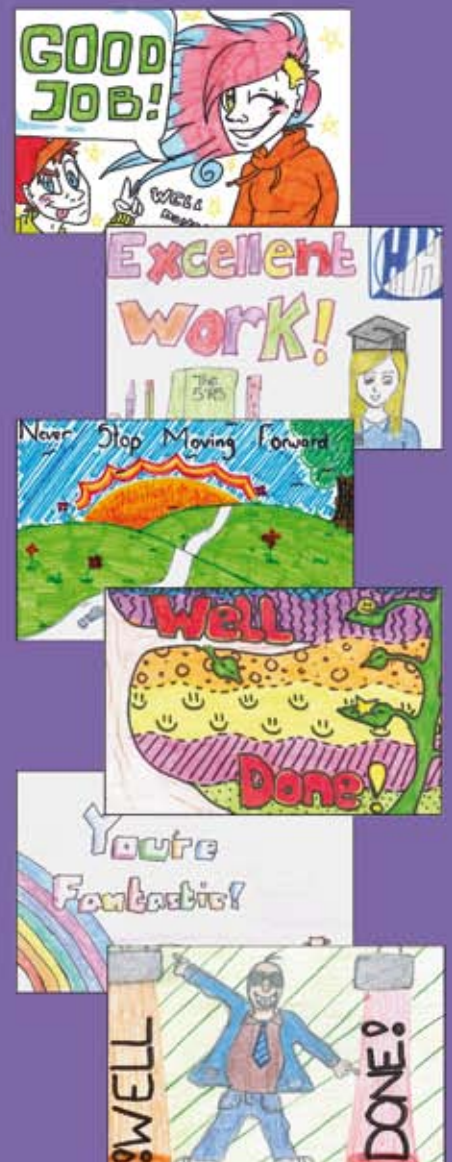

The Art Department ran its second overseas trip to Paris in July 2011. The group consisted of Year 10 students from Btec Art and Design and GCSE Fine Art as well as a number of Year 10 students from MFL. Following a very successful trip in 2010 it was decided to visit Paris for longer.

After a very early Monday morning start (2.00a.m!) from the gates of Hinde House School we crossed the Channel by Eurotunnel and arrived at our Paris hotel mid afternoon. Although it was not the heat wave of 2010, Paris was still very warm.

Over the next three days we made visits to the Musée d'Orsay to view famous impressionist paintings by Renoir, Degas, Gauguin and Toulouse Lautrec, the Musée de l'Orangerie for Monet's paintings of water lilies and The Louvre to see the famous Mona Lisa and her smile by Leonardo da Vinci. We also seized the opportunity to visit the famous Parisian sights which included the Eiffel Tower, the Arc de Triomphe, the Champs-Élysées and the Pompidou Centre where we were able to watch amazing street entertainers as well as undertaking some souvenir shopping. Some students volunteered to have their portraits painted by local street artists but paying for them was completely optional. A planned stop at a Paris McDonalds on the Champs-Élysées was a welcome break from the summer heat.

As we were in Paris for an extra day this year we decided to take a walk through the Tuileries followed by a boat trip on the Bateau Mouche. This was an excellent opportunity to see the sights of Paris from another viewpoint whilst being able to sit down! A ride on the famous Paris Metro underground was an amusing spectacle for the group at Mr Grayson's expense. Design & Technology Theme Day

This has encouraged the students to practise their speaking and listening skills in English and give them first-hand experience to stimulate their writing.
