academically strong and eager to learn. I imagine he would do well as an apprentice engineer. Jake has used his time here very well and was a credit to the school.

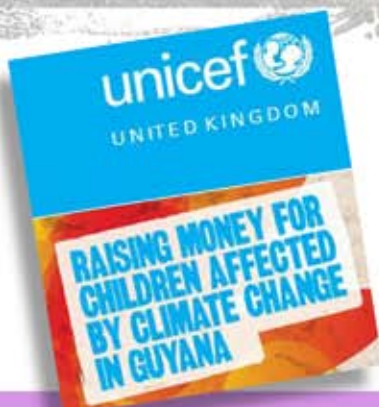
* Matthew's work rate is very high and is always available to his peers for help and advice. He has a good sense of humour and knows when to apply it.

Arches Partnership Dance Performance

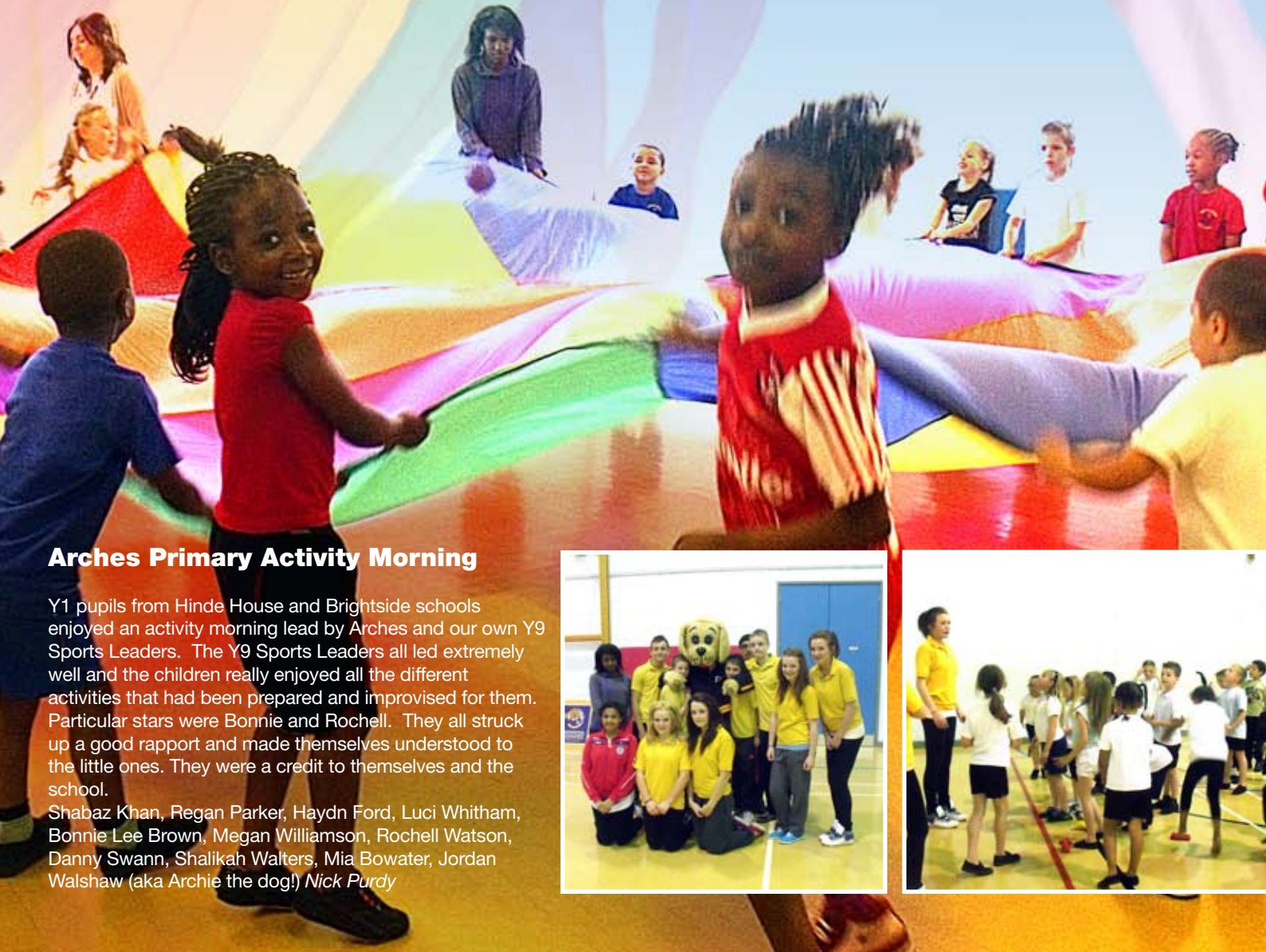

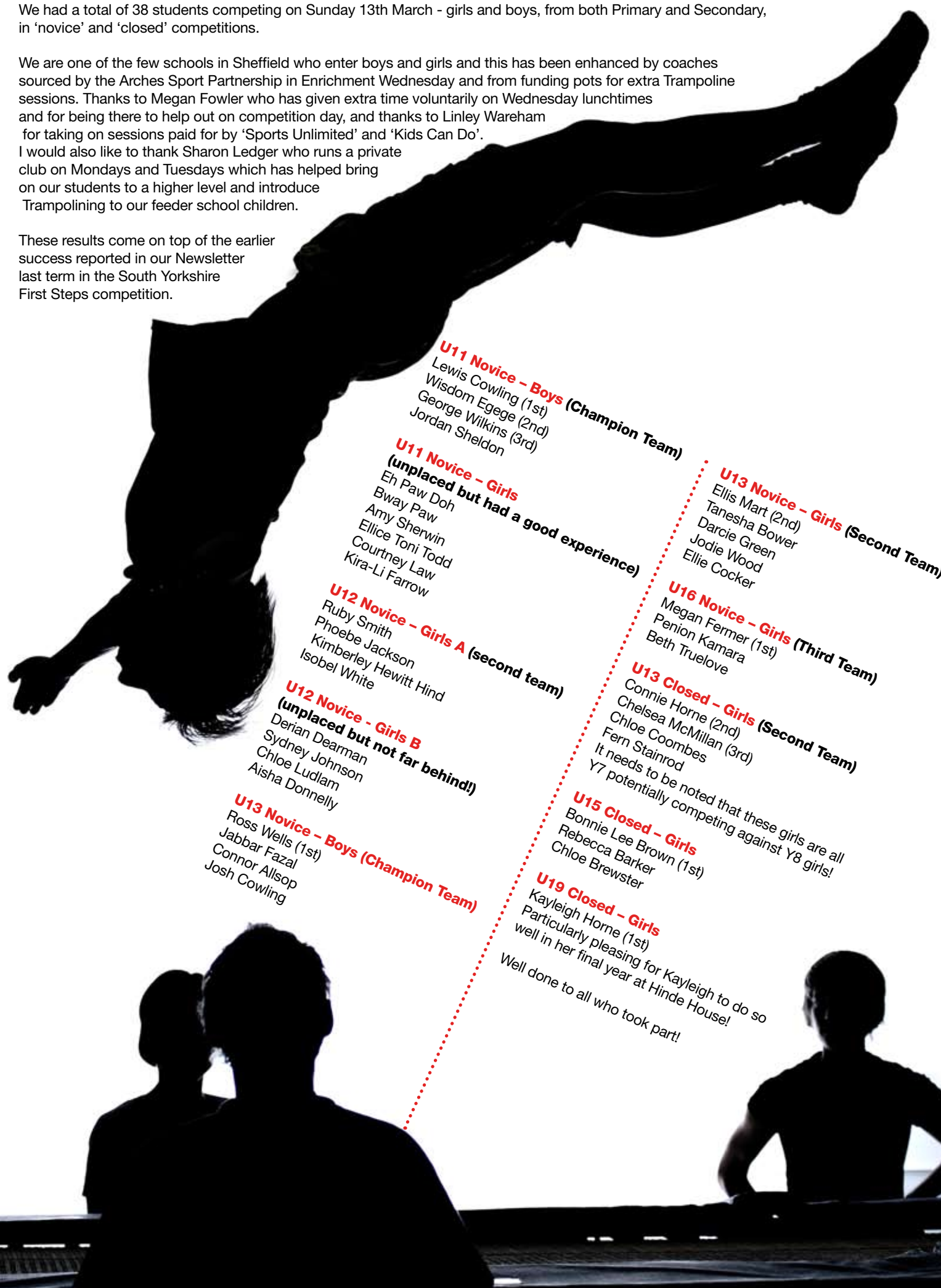

ATTENDANCE

Attendance Matters

Each school year has 190 teaching days and it is important that every pupil needs to attend 95% or more.

Two weeks holiday taken during term time means 10 days of schooling is lost which is equivalent to over 5% of the school year (60 lessons!). This will mean attendance will have dropped to 95% without any further absence.

It is important to emphasise the need for excellent attendance as it has such a huge impact on achievement. Over the years, achievement data shows that a pupil who attends 95% or more reaches or exceeds their targets. While a pupil with below 95% attendance finds it very difficult to reach their targets and it will have a 'knock-on' effect year on year.

If you have questions or concerns over your child's attendance then please do not hesitate to contact school and speak to their Year Leader or to Mrs Robson, Deputy Head.

Remember! If you have any problems, day or night, you can use the new SHARP System. Just log on to the website <http://hindehouse.thesharpsystem.com> to send an e-mail into school with any worry or concern at whatever time of day or night. These e-mails will be picked up each school morning and dealt with as quickly as we can in a confidential way.

We believe that every child should be safe and feel safe. We work hard to support each child during the school day and we want everyone to have adults in school that they can turn to if they have a problem.
